














#### RACE COMMITTEE NEWS...

Our members love to travel and participate in local events! Here are a few highlights from recent activities! Thank you to all that have shared their adventures for the newsletter, keep them coming!!

In April Linda Maksel flew to Sacramento California, explored and then drove to San Francisco to explore Fisherman's Warf and across the Goden Gate Bridge to drive up Muir Woods to hike through

the historic redwoods.















Vice Commodore Ron Carew took a road trip to visit points of interest and memorial sites, starting with the 1<sup>st</sup> battle War of 1812 at Ft Mackinac, stopping in Youngstown Ohio on the way to the Flight 93 Memorial in Shanksville, Pa, then on to Ft McHenry where the fort is much the same as it was in 1814. This was the location of the last battle of the war of 1812. The daily raising of the flag each morning is impressive. Three different sizes of flag are used depending on the wind, with the largest being 30x40 ft. Additionally there were stops at the Arlington Cemetery, the Canadian side of Niagara falls and the larges Christmas store in the USA located in and old Bavarian village. A stop in the Upper Peninsula of MI to stay with a buddy who he does mission trips to Alaska with. The bridge to UP is similar to the Skyway in that it connects two pieces of land to make travel easier. When going to Mackinac we had the ferry ride to Mackinac Island to ourselves. Mackinac island has a million visitors in the summer and the season had not started yet! Also, there have been no cars allowed on the island since 1912. There are over 500 workhorses (Belgian and Percheron)that deliver all supplies and for doing trash collection. Here are a few moments from his travels!
