- Served on boats in Vietnam '68,'69
- Owned and sailed a 13-ton spoon-bowed coastal schooner for 18 years; cruised from Tarpon Springs to Dry Tortugas and every pass, port, creek and gunk hole in between.
- Raced on crews as navigator and tactician in PHRF (including Clearwater to Key West, and all local West Coast events), Columbus Day Regatta in Miami.



- Sailed out of Los Angeles into the Pacific
- Pursuing his affinity for traditional sail, he has been aboard the Clipper Ship Peking in NYC, the whaler Joseph Conrad in Mystic, Conn., the Nina replica locally, the Star of India clipper in San Diego and the USS Constitution in Boston.
- He was on the Bounty when the Navy Captain who would sail Old Ironsides for the first time in 100 years came to learn how to sail a square-rigged ship. By the way, the new 10,000 square feet of sails for her were built locally by Doyle Sails. He served on the Volunteer Sail Training crew for 6 months in 1997. On board eventually as Mast Captain on the mizzen (aft) mast.
- He lives in **Clearwater** with his remarkable wife Beth, in a 97-year-old house. He is 78 and drives a 67-year-old car. Thank goodness Beth also appreciates old things.

Before and After

Life of a Referee and Timekeeper

Mikey, here are 6 pics., from a recent Boxing event in the Tampa Bay area.



Two, show Phyllis at her Ringside, Time-Keeper's position. Note the electronic Clock, Bell, Hammers, Whistle, & additional hand held Stop watches. Setting next to her, is the alternate Referee, who is the "Knock-Down" time keeper, for 10 counts.

The others show some action pics, during the main event. I am a Judge, during the rounds, but obviously can't

take a picture, when I am Judging a bout.

These shots came, when I had a break, between my scheduled Judging bouts.





All Pro rounds are 3 minutes in duration, with a 1 minute rest period. Rounds are scheduled for a 4, 6, 8, 10, or 12 round Contest. 12, being reserved for Title bouts.

The "Time-Keeper", has the additional responsibility, to start a hand held stopwatch, at the moment a Boxer is knock-down. If that felled fighter, is back up, on his feet before 30 seconds has elapsed, a 30

day Medical suspension in enforced. If he is down, over 30 seconds, but up before 2 minutes has elapsed, a 90 day Medical suspension is imposed. If the Boxer is unresponsive and down over two minutes, a 180 day Medical suspension. With a complete MRI, CAT-SCAN, and Neurological evaluation by a MD, is mandated, in order to be licensed to Box again. All of this is logged into a National data base, at the ABC, (American Boxing Commissioners), out of St. Louis, Missouri.

If you are KO'd, 4 times, over a two year period, you're finished, license revoked.

This gives the average, casual Boxing fan, an insider's view, as to the duties of the Time-Keeper. Like riding the Bell to start each Round. Then again, at the rounds conclusion. Plus, with 10 seconds left on the 3 minute rd. A Rubber Hammer, is struck hard, upon a block of wood. Thus letting both Boxers, Ref, Judges, and Corners know there is 10 seconds left until the Bell rings, to conclude the round.

Then, at 50 seconds, have elapsed in the 1 minute rest period, the Time-Keeper, blows a loud Whistle. To alert, Corner men, Boxer's, and officials know, in 10 seconds, the New round will commence.

Just a few notes, to enlighten our fellow seaman/boaters and sporting enthusiasts, about the "Sweet Science", as Boxing is fondly referred to.

Product Review – Contigo Travel Mug

Not my first product review, but the one most members will find useful. It is the **Contigo Travel Mug** (Amazon link below). I spotted my son's Go-To-Work coffee mug last spring. Jason ranted about how good it was, so I decided to try one myself.

Fast forward to mid-September when I was leaving for my NY-PA-NC-TN-KY-FL road trip. I fixed a cup of coffee the usual way and poured it into the Contigo, and hit the road. When I got to I-75 heading North, I took a sip of the coffee. I could not believe it was still too hot to drink. Even after 2.5 hours and lots of sips, the coffee was still warm enuff to be satisfying.

As some of you know, I drive a car with a very stiff ride. A sailboat is often a bouncy, wobbly ride, but imagine much faster. Trying to drink coffee from a cup while driving, even with a lid, can be a messy thing. This is where the Contigo shows its true colors. Never once did I spill coffee, or get a large gulp of hot coffee, while driving. The opening is trigger operated, and even has a lock button so you won't accidentally leak by pressing the button.

As an aside, I expect this mug would be good for cold drinks in a sailboat cockpit too.
